Rotarians in Lithuania and Chicago, Illinois, USA, are using their influence to promote the use of "bubble helmets" and potentially lessen the need for mechanical ventilators for COVID-19 patients who struggle to breathe on their own. It is one of many ways that Rotary clubs are responding to the pandemic.

The Rotary Club of Vilnius Lithuania International, Lithuania, participated in <u>Hack</u> <u>the Crisis</u>, an online event in March that brought together innovators in science and technology to "hack," or develop solutions to, issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Members of the Lithuanian club, along with members of the Rotary Clubs of Chicago and Chicagoland Lithuanians (Westmont), joined a team to brainstorm ways to help COVID-19 patients breathe without using mechanical ventilators.

"Traditional ventilators used with intubation are a painful intervention into the body and require trained medical staff," says Viktorija Trimbel, a member of the Vilnius Lituanica club, who was a mentor during Hack the Crisis. "There's also a shortage of the drugs used for sedation. But you don't have to be sedated with helmets."

Bubble helmets are noninvasive and supply oxygen without the need for intubation, a procedure where a tube is inserted down a patient's throat. A helmet fits over a patient's head with a rubber collar that can be adjusted around the neck. The collar has ports that can deliver oxygen and air.

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Before the pandemic, doctors typically used noninvasive devices to help patients breathe if their oxygen levels dropped below a certain level. If the noninvasive devices don't boost those levels enough, mechanical ventilators are used to push oxygen into the lungs through the tube at a preset rate and force.



"Being a Rotarian, I have in my network people from all over the world," adds Victorija Trimbel, governor-elect of the district that covers Lithuania.

HOW MY LIFE WAS CHANGED



When you think back over your life there are inevitably people and events that had a profound impact on determining just who you are. As I look back, one person who had a profound impact on the person that I have become is no other than Mr. Anup. S. Jubbal, the Founder of Canadian Eyesight Global.

It all began back in 1973 in the B.C. interior city of Kamloops. I was a charter faculty member of what was then called Cariboo College and what is today, Thompson Rivers University. I taught courses in geography and was Head of the Geography Department was also served as Chairman of the Department of Social Sciences. In that year I had also been elected to the Kamloops City Council and was appointed by the Mayor to the Thompson Nicola Regional District. It was at this time that a lifelong friendship with Anup Jubbal began.

During City Council meetings I noticed, at certain times, a rather short fellow, always wearing a suit and tie and proudly sporting a bright turban. I was especially interested in city planning issues. So was Mr. Jubbal. He was a very active land developer and was often working to rezone certain parcels of land. After meetings we often met to discuss his various development proposals. Lobbying was very personal in those days. He was the first Indo-Canadian I had ever met. There was large Indo-Canadian community in а Kamloops and I had seen the Sikh Temple during my travels. It was a rather exotic looking building but what occurred inside was a complete mystery to me. At one of our frequent chats Mr. Jubbal asked me if I, with by wife and two young sons, would like to visit the Temple. Here my life was about to be influenced rather profoundly. We went.

The four of us arrived Sunday morning at the Temple. Hundreds of brown skinned people were descending on the place. Women in bright colorful sarees and other Punjabi outfits sat on the floor on one side of the Temple and men on the other. My first surprise was taking off our shoes at the doorway. My wife was smart enough to wear a shawl while the two boys and I tied large handkerchiefs on our heads to cover our hair. Anup's lovely wife Saroop guided my wife to

Nelson Riis is a Canadian businessman and former politician and Member of Parliament of Canada, for the New Democratic Party (NDP). Mr. Riis served as an MP for Kamloops, BC from 1980 until 2000, and held the positions of Parliamentary House Leader, Deputy Party Leader, Caucus Chair and served on the Finance Committee in the House of Commons. Mr. Riis specialized in fiscal and monetary policy development. A geographer and teacher by profession, Riis taught in public schools and at the post-secondary level. He taught at what is presently known as Thompson Rivers University, and served as chair of social sciences for ten years. He served as an alderman in Kamloops, British Columbia from 1973 to 1978, and as a school trustee from 1978 until 1980. He was director of the Thompson-Nicola Regional District.

> the women's section. Mr. Jubbal took charge of us men. The music, the incomprehensible language, the fragrance in the air, the praying, the chanting, the pictures on the walls, the placing of our foreheads on the carpet, surrounded by turban wearing men, the specially-garbed men overseeing the Holy Book and then being served in our hands a porridge- like food to eat- Then, to top it off, we all went down to the basement to partake in a tasty meal of real delicious northern Indian food. It was a mind- blowing experience. I seem to recall that people starred at us at first but were so accommodating and accepting of our presence. Everyone went out of their way to make us feel welcome. And, welcome we did feel. I remember the occasion as if it was only yesterday. It had such a profound impact on me. I would never again be the same. Talk about cultural shock to a young man who had never been anywhere except Western Canada.

> It would be an understatement to say that Mr. Jubbal's invitation changed my life but the Temple experience was only the beginning. My family and I attended often after that. We brought our friends with us so over the years dozens of Kamloops' residents were introduced to the Community. Personally, my interest was piqued in everything about India and its history, the Sikh Religion and the Golden Temple, the culture, life in the villages, the music, the language, how Sikhs had changed the world, the food and especially the people. They were different and different in so many ways. I had so much to learn and over almost the next fifty years.

"Mr. Jubbal was to be my teacher, but more than that. A mentor, a guide, a visionary, a model, an inspiration- a friend!

I had no idea just how much my life was about to change because I had the good fortune to meet Mr. Jubbal."



Indo-Canadian Airways all set for a take-off

A non-resident Indian-owned company based in Canada will begin operating a regional air-taxi service in India with a fleet of 5 Canadian-manufactured Dash-8 aircraft based in Bombay.

Mr. Anup Singh Jubbal, Chairman and CEO of LLW Landlords world inc. of Vancouver B.C. Canada declared to incorporate Indo-Canadian Airways. "While we are launching a number of business ventures throughout India, this company will provide air taxi services, will offer regional scheduled air linc services in India, and shall be starting soon air cargo charter services to Europe and North America"he stated. All the aircraft would be on wet- lease basis.

Another one of his business ventures is the promotion of visitor travel from Canada to India which includes residential colonies to NRIs in different parts of India.

The company has technical links with Lardel Holidays, a Canadian air operator and other airlines in Canada as well as in SA Express, a recently formed regional airline in South Africa.

Indo-Canadian airways will have full support from Indian states including Punjab, Haryana, Maharashtra, Orissa West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh.



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

That appears to meet a key demand from NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh, in exchange for the New Democrats' support for a motion to limit sittings and votes in the House of Commons through the summer.

Docovor



This beautiful, splendid building was built by 4th Nawab of Awadh - Nawab Asaf-Ud-Daula and the construction work began in the year 1784. It took over 14 years to complete and was designed by the architects Hafiz Kifayat Ullah and Shahjahanabadi, prominent architects of that time.

The massive central hall of the imambara (a Shia Muslim meeting hall) is considered to be the largest arched hall in the world built without any kind of external support from wooden, iron, or stone beams.

The trick that keeps the ceiling from crashing in on visitors is also the imambara's most intriguing architectural feature, the Bhulbhulaiya, a extremely complicated network of nearly a thousand interconnected passageways built directly above the chambers, thus reducing the weight of the ceiling by making it hollow. Loosely translated as "maze" in Hindi, the bhulbhulaiya is impossible for visitors to navigate without a guide.

It is made up of individual Canadians concerned about other people – those in India and such developing nations who are especially vulnerable to blindness as well as those who have already lost their eyesight. In these nations, there are many health and social issues that require attention. Because blindness is caused by many problems, including lack of adequate nutrition, sanitation and trauma, we have the opportunity to bring health in many different forms.

OUR OBJECTIVE

Canadian Eyesight Global strives to help those who are unable to help themselves and to give people who are blind or visually impaired real support. For over 29 years, we have been helping our community with our partner doctors in India and other developing countries to enhance the facilities and treatment programs, with outstanding results.

OUR VISION

Our Vision is to eliminate avoidable blindness by 2020 and to ensure the best possible vision for all people. Canadian Eyesight Global organization is working to remove blindness that is a major health issue among the young, the underprivileged, the aged. Visual impairment in some instances can lead to death. The problem is growing day by day. Every second, one person in the world goes blind. A child goes blind every minute. Yet for three out of four of these people, blindness was completely preventable.

Global trends show millions of people going blind each year. Eighty percent of the worlds blindness is preventable by means of nutrition, sanitation, antibiotics or surgery. Canadian Eyesight's view is to work toward the elimination of the preventable causes of blindness. Working with other health organizations and various levels of government, we believe this goal is achievable.
