

Canada's Prime Minister accepts Polio Honor

Justin Trudeau, prime minister of Canada, was presented with Rotary's Polio Eradication Champion Award in recognition of Canada's contributions to polio eradication.

Trudeau accepted the award at the Rotary International Convention in Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Canada has been a strong contributor to polio eradication efforts for decades. In 2017, it pledged US\$75 million to help eradicate polio, bringing its total contributions to roughly \$640 million.

"Prime Minister Trudeau has committed Canada to remain a strong partner until polio is completely eradicated," said Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley. "With the unwavering support of the Prime Minister and the Canadian government and their strong assistance with continued vaccination efforts, I'm confident we will rid the world of polio."

Canadian Rotary members have also contributed more than US\$38 million.

"Canada's long-standing political and financial commitment helps our dedicated health workers, mostly women, go the extra mile and vaccinate every child to build a polio-free world," Akhil Iyer, director of the Polio Eradication Programme at UNICEF, has said.

Rotary established the Polio Eradication Champion Award in 1995 to recognize heads of state, health agency leaders, and others who have made a significant contribution to polio eradication.

Trudeau is the third Canadian prime minister to receive the award, along with Jean Chrétien and Stephen Harper. Past recipients also include Shinzo Abe, prime minister of Japan; Angela Merkel, chancellor of Germany; Xavier Bettel, prime minister of Luxembourg; Muhammadu Buhari, president of Nigeria; Neven Mimica, European commissioner for international cooperation and development; and Ban Ki-moon, former UN secretary-general.

They have two daughters, one goddaughter, and two grandsons.







The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) is a public -private partnership led by national governments with five partners - the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Its goal is to eradicate polio worldwide.

HISTORY OF POLIO

In the early 20th century, polio was one of the most feared diseases in industrialized countries, paralyzing hundreds of thousands of children every year. Soon after the introduction of effective vaccines in the 1950s and 1960s however, polio was brought under control and practically eliminated as a public health problem in these countries.

It took somewhat longer for polio to be recognized as a major problem in developing countries. Lameness surveys during the 1970s revealed that the disease was also prevalent in developing countries. As a result, during the 1970s routine immunization was introduced worldwide as part of national immunization programmes, helping to control the disease in many developing countries.

In 1988, when the Global Polio Eradication Initiative began, polio paralysed more than 1000 children worldwide every day. Since then, more than 2.5 billion children have been immunized against polio thanks to the cooperation of more than 200 countries and 20 million volunteers, backed by an international investment of more than US\$ 11 billion.

There are now only 3 countries that have never stopped polio transmission and global incidence of polio cases has decreased by 99%.

There has also been success in eradicating certain strains of the virus; of the three types of wild polioviruses (WPVs), the last case of type 2 was reported in 1999 and its eradication was declared in September 2015; the most recent case of type 3 dates to November 2012.

However, tackling the last 1% of polio cases has still proved to be difficult. Conflict, political instability, hard-to-reach populations, and poor infrastructure continue to pose challenges to eradicating the disease. Each country offers a unique set of challenges which require local solutions. Thus, in 2013 the Global Polio Eradication Initiative launched its most comprehensive and ambitious plan for completely eradicating polio. It is an all-encompassing strategic plan that clearly outlines measures for eliminating polio in its last strongholds and for maintaining a polio-free world.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is a public-private partnership led by national governments with five partners – the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Its goal is to eradicate polio worldwide.

WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION

WHO coordinates the major strategic planning, management and administration processes of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. WHO is responsible for the systematic collection, collation and dissemination of standardized information on strategy implementation and impact, particularly in the areas of surveillance and supplementary immunization activities.

A WHO jeep, for use in the national polio surveillance project, is transported across a river in Bihar, India

WHO also coordinates operational and basic research, provides technical and operational support to ministries of health, and coordinates training and deployment of human resources for supplementary technical assistance.

In addition, WHO has a lead role in establishing certificationstandard surveillance of acute flaccid paralysis (AFP), resource mobilization. donor coordination, advocacv communications. WHO serves as secretariat to the certification process and facilitates implementation and monitoring of biocontainment activities.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

More than one million Rotary members have volunteered their time to polio eradication

Rotary International is the world's first and largest humanitarian service organization with a global network of 1.2 million members in more than 170 countries. Through its PolioPlus programme, established in 1985, Rotary was the first to have the vision of a polio-free world.

Rotary's primary responsibilities include fundraising, advocacy, and volunteer recruitment.

More than one million Rotary members have volunteered their time and personal resources to polio eradication. Rotary members also provide valuable field support during National Immunization Days through social mobilization and by administering the oral polio vaccine to children.

Rotary is the main private sector donor to polio eradication, and will have contributed more than US\$ 1.2 billion by 2013.

In November 2007, Rotary International entered in a unique partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to inject a further US\$ 555 million into the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND **PREVENTION**

CDC works to protect people from health threats by conducting critical scientific research and supplying health information. CDC provides scientific and technical expertise to the GPEI through the Global Immunization Division (GID), Polio and Picornavirus Laboratory, and Stop Transmission of Polio (STOP) teams. GID staff works jointly with WHO, UNICEF, and other GPEI partners, as well as national Ministries of Health,to plan and monitor polio surveillance and immunization activities in countries, and supports other eradication projects, such as tracking disease transmission trends and vaccine efficacy research.

CDC uses state-of-the-art virological surveillance expertise to

investigate polio outbreaks.

The Polio and Picornavirus Laboratory in CDC's Division of Viral Diseases is a WHO Global Specialized Laboratory and delivers technical and programmatic assistance to the Global Polio Laboratory Network. CDC's labs provide critical diagnostic services, perform genomic sequencing of polioviruses to guide eradication efforts, and help overcome specific operational challenges to enable more rapid detection of wild poliovirus and allow for faster outbreak response. STOP staffers help build capacity for acute flaccid paralysis surveillance, the gold-standard for detecting polio, as well as plan, implement, and evaluate immunization campaigns, in collaboration with GPEI partners.

UNITED NATIONS CHILDREN'S FUND

UNICEF procures and distributes polio vaccines for routine and supplementary immunizations. With WHO, UNICEF supports countries in the implementation of intensified National Immunization Days (NIDs) and Sub-National Immunization Days (SNIDs), as well as mop-up campaigns in countries.

UNICEF helps country programmes develop communication strategies that are vital to local acceptance of the vaccine. UNICEF also helps country programmes develop action plans and secure logistics to access hard-to-reach places, including in countries affected by conflict.

UNICEF contributes to the development of eradication policies, plans of action, training materials and public information, and is an active partner in advocacy and resource mobilization.

BILL & MELINDA GATES FOUNDATION

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is a major supporter of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, contributing technical and financial resources to accelerate targeted vaccination campaigns, community mobilization, and routine immunizations. BMGF works with partners to improve polio surveillance and outbreak response; develop safer, more effective vaccines; and galvanize financial and political support for polio eradication efforts. BMGF has a unique ability to contribute by taking big risks and making non-traditional investments. Examples include investments in vaccine research; funding of geographic information system (GIS) maps to replace hand-drawn maps for campaign planning; and the establishment of emergency operations centres in Nigeria, Pakistan, and Afghanistan.

PROJECT EYESIGHT 1989

In 1989, the Founder and CEO Anup Singh Jubbal established the Project Eyesight with the cooperation of Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings and the Rotary Club of Lucknow Khass.



This project was financed by an aid of over a quarter million Indian rupees provided by the Rotary Club of Burnaby Hastings, Rotary District 504, Canada on the one hand and resources in men, money and materials raised by the Rotary Club of Lucknow Khaas of Rotary District 312.



The Canadian Deputy High Commissioner to India, His Excellency Mr. Gary Smith, accompanies by his First Secretary-Development, and five delegate Rotarians from Burnaby, Canada, visited some of the camps and made a first hand appraisal of the enormity of medical problems in rural India and the contribution made in this field by PROJECT EYESIGHT 1989.



Rotarian Jagdish K Hansraj, Secretary—Organizing Committee of the Rotary Club of Lucknow Khaas recollects:

- The committee decided that mid-December will be the right time to start the camps;
- Increase the number of patients per camp and decrease the total number of camps to reduce overheads;
- Enlarging the area of publicity to maximize coverage;
- Greater involvement of local population in the management of camps.
- Rotary Club of Lucknow Khaas will provide planning and organizational expertise and the equipment and infrastructure from its own resources.

The club also arranged the medical expertise from the resources of the Medical School with the local population providing more support to run the project.

"Modus Operandi"

Once camp sites were finalized, advance publicity vans visited villages announcing the camp schedules. Handbills were distributed and posters and banners were displayed.

Intensive publicity was able to draw out large crowds of around 400 to each camp on average. Local village schools, Primary Health Centres, and Government dispensaries were used to house the camps.







Diabetic Retinopathy

Introduction: Diabetes is a chronic disease which causes several microvascular (retinopathy, neuropathy and nephropathy) and macrovascular (heart attack, stroke) complications. Diabetic retinopathy is one of the complications of diabetes which affects the eyes and is caused by the damage to the blood vessels of the retina. Diabetic retinopathy is the most common cause of legal blindness in adults. Loss of vision is associated with significant increase in morbidity and mortality including increased risk of falls, hip fracture and mortality.

Screening: Screening for retinopathy should be initiated 5 years after diagnosis of type 1 diabetes in patients >15 years and in all patients at time of diagnosis of type 2 diabetes. Screening should be done by an ophthalmologist or experienced optometrist. If retinopathy is present, retinopathy severity should be diagnosed and appropriate monitoring intervals (\leq 1 year) should be established. If retinopathy is not present, patients with type 1 diabetes should be rescreened annually and type 2 diabetes every 1–2 years.

Risk factors: There are several risk factors for the development and progression of diabetic retinopathy which include poor diabetes control, increased blood pressure, hypercholesterolemia, anemia, pregnancy (with type 1 diabetes), proteinuria and longer duration of diabetes. People with diabetes should know their ABC of diabetes. A stands for A1C (glycated hemoglobin, marker of glucose control over the past 3 months) which should be <7%, tight glycemic control is recommended to prevent the development and progression of diabetic retinopathy; B stands for blood pressure which should be <130/80; C stands for cholesterol, low density lipoprotein (LDL, bad cholesterol) which should be <2.0. Optimal management of these associated risk factors is important to reduce the development and progression of complications particularly diabetic retinopathy.

Treatment: There are several treatment modalities available for diabetic retinopathy which include laser therapy (retinal photocoagulation), intraocular (local) injection of pharmacological agents and vitreoretinal surgery (vitrectomy). Studies have shown that laser therapy reduces visual loss and legal blindness by 90% in patients with severe proliferative or non-proliferative diabetic retinopathy. Significant advancement has been made in the past few years in local, systemic and surgical treatments of diabetic eye disease with improved visual outcome. In spite of all the advancements, early detection and management of diabetic retinopathy is extremely important to preserve the vision and prevent blindness.

Helping blind see earns Burnaby Rotarian a Medal

Never before have so many blind people been able to see again.

Thanks to businessman Anup Singh Jubbal, 31,00 people have regained their eyesight.

All thanks to a simple cataract operation, which costs about \$20.

"Eye operations are so expensive for a man coming from a village In India," said Jubbal. "The price Is exorbitant."

The Burnaby resident is to receive a Meritorious Service Medal for his work from Governor Romeo LeBlanc in Ottawa this September.

Jubbal said people are very emotional after the operation.

"A blind man has to eat, walk and do things at home. He lives on the mercy of others. When his eyesight returns, he can do whatever he wants.

"There was one case where an 18-year-old girl, blind all her life, gave birth and saw her child for the first time.

"You see all that happiness, all for a lousy \$20.

Project Eyesight-India started in 1989 when Jubbal, a member of The Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings, proposed helping people in his native land.

"Nobody objected, because I'd raised money for another project," he said. "Everyone knew there was a large cataract problem in India.

"Eighteen million have them because of poor diet, the inability to protect their eyes from the hot sun and blowing sand."

Jubbal contacted hundreds of Rotary clubs across India, which supplied doctors. Eye-testing equipment was donated by the Rotary club in Vanderhoof.

"We got a lot of help," he said.

Small camps were set up in villages. The locals were alerted by heating drums, posters and free newspaper ads.

Doctors remove the growth that prevents vision while the patient us under an anesthetic. Sometimes the only light available is a flash light.

This year 10,000 more operations will be done. The Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings will contribute \$25,000, Rotary



International \$25,000 and \$50,000 will come from the Canadian International Development Corp.

"I believe in doing good service for mankind," said Jubbal, who started his charity work in 1981, "I was born and brought up that way."

His large collection of mementoes include a letter from former prime minister Brian Mulroney.

While raising her 5 children, and now enjoying her time with her 9grandchildren, she has always gracefully and







Ultimately, they're in charge of making sure that another human being's life has improved. None of this would happen without teams of volunteers who know the outcomes of their efforts are more important than the many sacrifices they have to make. Wherever Canadian Evesight Global has been, lives have improved. Our volunteers have an undeniable sense of responsibility and love for humanity. 



Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911, He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon.

It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self.

The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service.



Giving Light to the World Impact of Eye Clinics in Canada and India

Canadian Eyesight Global (formally Project Eyesight-India, since 1989) is a Canadian not-for-profit registered society, comprised of surgeons, doctors, business leaders, and numerous volunteers concerned with prevention of global blindness. CEG consists of hundreds active volunteers and helped non-profit communities. and has restored the eyesight of tens of thousands of people in rural parts of India since 1989. In Canada free eye clinics are being held quarterly since 2014, in local communities supported by volunteer ophthalmologists optometrists. Thousands of people were helped screening their vision, needy people were given free eye drops and the patients requiring further treatment were referred to the specialist eye surgeons for further treatment.

Canada

Routine eye examinations for adults aged 19 to 64 are not covered by the Medical Services Plan (MSP) unless they are medically required. Senior people aged 65 and above may visit the eye doctor to check-up their eyesight once a year. The free eye clinics in temples and local community centers provide the best place for eye care. and in a language the community speaks. These eye clinics provide an opportunity for those who may not have access to examinations by an ophthalmologist or optometrist. The eye clinics were developed to address the unmet needs that target the prevention and management of South Asian communities in the language. This target population may face several cultural, linguistic, or financial barriers when seeking eye examinations. These eye clinics help in the early detection of common eye conditions and prevention of chronic conditions such as cataract and glaucoma. It also raises the conversation amongst the community regarding concerns for eye care, which may often be otherwise attributed to an aging population.

India

In India hundreds of Rotary Clubs, local eye hospitals and dedicated volunteers joined forces with Canadian Eyesight Global(formerly Project since 1989), Eyesight-India provided free cataract surgeries to tens of thousands of people and unlimited people were treated for preventable blindness since 1989. Significant support was provided by Rotary International, non-governmental agencies in Canada and India, in addition to the support from the Sikh temples and Indo-Canadian community. These free eye camps are free and often the only hope for needy and helpless people living in rural parts of India, who are afflicted with cataracts. It is especially difficult for individuals with low economic status to have the operations due to the expensive costs in India. Many of these eye camps in India are sponsored by donors who want to help people in their villages or nearby areas.

Personal Experience

I worked with almost all the eve clinics held throughout the Greater Vancouver area since its inception in 2004. Bringing the eye clinics to the local community, such as in the temples or community centers, removes the barrier of accessibility to ensuring people take the first step towards having their eyes examined, and prevent or address complications. Culturally sensitive and relevant information provided to the people allows them to understand and gain the knowledge for the importance of eye care. Many people who come to the eye clinics bring their family members and friends who would not otherwise have considered having their examined. Treatment options are provided ensuring their needs are met. Quarterly eye clinics provide the community with opportunities to ensure that people are taking the necessary steps to have healthy eyes.



Project Eyesight in India



A Report by Dr. Irwin F. Stewart, FRCS(C) R.I. District Governor 5040 (1993-94) Canada

This report is based on a Rotary Friendship trip made to India by Dr. and Mrs. Stewart and Dr. Lionel Fishman, Past President, Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings (25 November to 10 December 1995).

The Rotary Project of offering cataract surgery to poor people in India has been supported both by Rotary International and The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) and operates on the basis that each cataract surgery costs in India about CAD\$20. R.I. District 5040 has provided about \$7.50 of each \$20 to act as a stimulus to local Indian Rotary Clubs to set up free cataract surgery camps in remote areas. We have also stipulated that a tree must be planted and a commemorative plaque erected to mark the occasion of the eye camp as an international joining of hands across the world. Visits and participation were made to three eye camps by the group of Rotarians. The villages and towns where the camps were held were Raikote, Narunangal and Amritsar.

The Rotary Club of Raikote had brought an ophthalmologist our to examine 125 patients the day of the eye camp, and of these 25 patients were found to have cataracts. With such a small group, it was planned to take them into the next town, because the larger center had a microscope and surgery would be more easier and more predictable and there would be more chances of sterile technique. All were grateful for the Canadian Participation.

Narunangal, a remote village virtually at the end of a recognizable road, existed through subsistence faming. There was a very large crowd at the clinic, people were dressed poorly and the medical lineup seemed to trail out the door and go on forever. At that stage 150 patients had already been evaluated.

We discussed the surgery with the doctor and found that he would operate in thee village the next day under adverse conditions (by our North American standards) because the villagers refused to leave their village even for medical help. Again they expressed gratitude and we came away understanding better some of the problems encountered in settings such as this.

The third camp we visited was in the town of Amritsar, Where the ophthalmologist had examined 100 patients, and of these 20 had operable cataracts. The Rotary Club had in conjunction with the cataract Project Eyesight, a blind school and a vocational school which they operated and which we were able to tour. It made us very proud to see that the spirit of Project Eyesight in India had taken on real meaning in Amritsar. Our visit to the eye camps was a vivid reinforcement of how much our part of the world has and how little some of the people in India have. We came away convinced that the program Rotary Project Eyesight in India, carried out by Rotary in B.C., is a most worth while type of person to person aid and every effort should be made to continue this type of project. There are 31,500 grateful patients in India who have been given the wonderful gift of vision who would agree. The coordinator and chair of Rotary Project Eyesight in India is Anup Singh Jubbal.

PROJECT EYESIGHT INDIA The Beginning with no end!

PROJECT EYESIGHT (INDIA) 1989 was inspired by an exchange of ideas between Mr. Anup Singh Jubbal of the Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings, BC, Canada, and Co. Dr. J. K. Rasogi of the Rotary Club of Lucknow-Khaas, India.

The Project envisaged the setting up of 8 Eye Relief Camps at different places within a radius of 50 KMs. From the City of Lucknow, U.P. India, the capital of India's most populous state, performing ONE THOUSAND free eye operations. The entire diagnostic and surgical services and also the other essentials such as housing, hospital beds, linens, medicines, food and spectacles etc. were all to be provided free. The Proposal required technical expertise from teams of highly qualified and well trained doctors dedicated to the eye relief project.

It all sounded something like having to put a well-equipped 100 bed eye hospital on wheels and then moving it from place to place taking medical care to the very door steps of the rural poor India.

Substantial funding via the Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings, BC, Canada, the organizational skill and dedication of Rotarians of Lucknow-Khaas and the devoted medical and para-medical staff of Lucknow's medical School - King George Medical College - combined to meet the challenge and convert the idea into realty.

The targets were achieved and the program promised to become an annual event.



Why I jumped at the chance to serve as a Board Member for Canadian Eyesight Global

It began as a young boy growing up in a small town of 500 souls in southern Alberta called Longview. Both parents were active community members and were strong socialists following CCF leader Tommy Douglas. My father was a union organizer and union activist and both were devoted church goers.

I grew up with values that were reflected in sayings such as, "Do onto others as you would have other do onto you" and "What we wish for ourselves we wish for all others". The self or the individual was less important than family, friends, church, community, province or country. "Love your neighbour as yourself" was meant to guide us through our lives.

In order to directly serve my community I became a public school teacher to help young people to become dedicated citizens and to work to make the world a better place. Later I became a charter professor at what today is Thompson Rivers University and taught Human Geography and also served as Chair of the Social Sciences Department. I was part of a young cadre of recent university graduates working to build a university from nothing other than a dream

While at the University I decided to run in a local election to serve on the City of Kamloops City Council and was successful. Also I was active on the Board of the Kamloops Museum Association and the Kamloops Art Gallery and active with the Kamloops Labour Council. the Canadian Legion and the Rocky Mountain Rangers Regiment to name only a few.

While serving on Council I had the good fortune to meet a local land developer by the name of Mr. Jubbal whom I immediately recognized to be a very special person. He had a heart of gold and was generous beyond imagination and immediately introduced me to the Kamloops Sikh community.

To this day, decades later, I still count many of the people I met in the Sikh community as close and very dear friends.

I went on eventually to run for the Kamloops School Board and hosted a weekly TV and radio show as well as a weekly newspaper column covering local issues of interest. While serving on the School Board I decided to run for a Kamloops, BC seat in Canada's Parliament in 1980. The campaign was a success and I had the honor of representing the people of the Kamloops area in Ottawa for the next twenty years. This position enabled me to offer services and support to my constituents in so many ways while Parliament

provided countless opportunities to improve the lives of other through new social/economic programs, oversea aid and development and so many other initiatives.

During these exciting and rewarding years I developed a very close friendship with Mr. Anup Jubbal and his lovely family and used him a mentor on many and frequent occasions. His suggestions, critical comments and recommendations were always reasoned, thoughtful and profound and always much appreciated. He was so much more to me than a good friend, he truly was a bright guiding light who always saw the good in people and in the world around us.

Therefore, when he asked me in the fall of 1989 if I would like to join with a number of dedicated and talented professionals to serve on the Board of Canadian Eyesight Global formerly Project Eyesight-India, since 1989, I was both humbled and ecstatic.

To do this hundreds and thousands of times for poor people borders on performing small miracles.

That's why I am so thankful and happy today to know that I have played a small role in making Canadian Eyesight Global the tremendous success it has achieved over these many years. Indeed, the world is a much better place today because of it."



t took 'six months' for Anup Singh Jubbal to reach Canada in the late 1960s. Groomed in a business family, he was a contractor of forests in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands when he heard about the golden opportunities, Canada. In those days, when the long distance air travel was non existent, Anup Singh Jubbal had to travel by ship to Iraq and all the way through Europe to New York. It was from there he reached Toronto. From Toronto, he took a train to the beautiful British Columbia. When the train stopped at Kamloops, he decided to get off. Thus began life of Anup Singh Jubbal in Canada.


After doing well in the real estate industry, he suffered a set back when BC's economy crashed in the eighties. It was then that he decided to dedicate his life to a worthy cause such as restoring eyesight of nearly 18 million suffering from Cataract deficiencies in India. Anup Singh Jubbal formed Project Eyesight India in 1989. The eyesight camps were set up all India in Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Maharashtra, Pradesh. In 2003, due to over-whelming support from all over Canada, Anup Singh Jubbal thought to create Canadian Eyesight International in 2003.

Canadian Eyesight International is a registered Canadian charitable organization comprising of surgeons, doctors, business leaders and numerous volunteers concerned with global blindness. It is made up of individual Canadians concerned about other people-those in India and such developing nations who are especially vulnerable to blindness as well as those who have already lost their eyesight. In these nations, there are many health and social issues that require attention. Because blindness is caused by many problems, including for example, nutrition, sanitation and trauma.



Canadian Eyesight International's mission is to restore eyesight, prevent blindness and improve visual ability of indigent persons living in India and the developing world who need this help, regardless of nationality, race, color, creed or religion. The operation of Canadian Eyesight International is through out Canada. With over 200 Rotary Clubs joining hands with this project in India, nearly 44,000 free cataract surgeries and over 100,000 people have been treated for prevention of blindness, in rural parts of India, since 1989. This mega task has been achieved by the support from Rotary International, non-government agencies in Canada and India, and specially support from the Sikh temples and Indo-Canadian community.

Anup Singh Jubbal who has been working on this project for most of the last two decades, has been awarded with many honors from the Government of Canada. He has received Queen's Meritorious Service Medal in 1977 recognizing his efforts to serve the community world over. He has also been felicitated by the Canadian rime Minister, Mr Stephan Harper in 2006 for providing vision to those who cannot otherwise afford it. His Selfless ambition to generate \$1 million to build a state of the art facility which will perform cataract surgeries, conduct eye clinics and host education and training programs in the Amritsar district of India, is now an achievable dream, especially after evaluating the support rendered by



Ind-Canadian community to this project.

Anup Sing Jubbal, leads a quiet life in Surrey, giving his complete attention to Shri Guru Hargobind Sahib Mata Sukhani Eye Hospital and Prevention of Blindness Centre. With strong support from the Rotarians world over and especially both in Canada and India, he has built a committed team whose altruistic beliefs will soon show wonder results by giving the 'gift of vision' to many from weaker sections of Indian society in a village of Chabba in Punjab.

You have clearly demonstrated the importance of working to CREATE AWARENESS and TAKE ACTION.






Saroop Kaur Jubbal, PHF **DIRECTOR, FOUNDING MEMBER**
