# Roshan- King of Melody and Qawaali

(College Principal). In the early 1940s, Roshan joined AIR, Delhi and worked as a

In 1948, Roshan came to Mumhai to find work as a music director. He struggled until a ce meeting with Kidar Sharma, who asked him to compose for his film "Neki aur Badi\* (1949). While this film was a flop, Kidar Shurma gave him his next film Baawre Nain and Roshan emerged as a player on the Bollywood music scene. The sensuality of Khuyalon mein kisi ke, the giddy feeling of falling into love with Sun bairi balam such beland Mujhe such-such buta do with the endearing kya.a.a.; the innocence of Mere rootthe huye balma..., the absolutely brilliantly sung and the totally despairing Ten duniya mein dil lagta nahi were all rich compositions that became extremely popular and many others.

In the early 1950s, Roshan worked extensively with singers Mukeshand Talat Mahmood. "Molhar", "Shisham", and "Anhonce" were some of the movies that he scored during the 50s. It was during this time that he composed one of the greatest bhajans ever heard in Hindi films. "Aciri main to prem discani mera dard na jane koyi" sung by Lata Mangoshkar for the movie Naubahur. He was not very successful commercially-speaking, yet garnered us respect from his colleagues. He also gave Indeewar and Anand Bakshi their first breaks in the industry as lyricists; these two would later become two of the most sought-after sonewriters in Mumbai in the late 1960s.

The 1960s proved to be the golden age for Roshan and his music. His remarkable ability to meld folk music with Indian classical music became his trademark and resulted in many a successful score. During this time Roshan gave the Hindi movie industry some unforgettable hits, such as "Na To Karavan Ki Talaesh Hai" and "Zindagi bhar nahi bhoolegi woh barsaat ki raat" ("Barsaat Ki Raat", 1960), "Ab Kya Missal Doon" and "Kabbi to milegi, kabi to milegi" ("Aarti", 1962), "Jo Vada Kiya Vo Nibhana Padega", "Paso Chhoon Lene Do" and "Jurm-e-ulfat pe" ("Taj Mahal", 1963), "Nigahen Milane To Jee Chahata Hai" and "Laaga Chunari Mein Daagh" ("Dil Hi To Hai", 1963), "Sunsaar Se Bhoage Phirte Ho" and "Mon Re Tu Kasho" ("Chitralekha", 1964), and "Oh Re Taal Mile" and "Khushi khushi kar do vida" ("Anokhi Rant", 1968). He also composed some unforgettable melodies for the movie Manua (1966) like 'Rahen na rahen hum' and 'Rehte the kabhi jinke dil mein'.

The most notable quality of his music was the melody. He had his own style of music and never compromised with the quality of his music. Nor did he ever play to the gallery. He is especially remembered for the music which he rendered for gawwalis Roshan had been suffering from chronic heart trouble for over 20 years and died of a heart attack on November 16, 1967 in Bombay, He won 1963 Filinfare Best Music Director Award for Taj Mahal. 

In Charge of the White Rock Detachment, Tom Forster, who brought her into our Millennium (now South Surrey) Rotary Club. Tom was President Elect and, recognizing Renee's organizational skills, attention to detail, thoroughness and capacity to get things done, compelled Renee to be his Secretary! With all her skills, charm and ability to be direct when necessary (in a wonderfully positive way) Renee contributed greatly to our Club. I

## DISTRICT 5050 FOUNDATION NEWS

Three years ago, in the Rotary year 2016-17, District 5050 Rotarians made a gift to The Rotary Foundation - Annual Fund-Share that helped District 5050 raise \$400,156 generating \$200,078 in District Designated Funds (DDF) in 2019-20.

As a result, this past Rotary year, your gift ensured that an above average number of our clubs could leverage their club funds by receiving a District or Global Grant. This allowed our clubs to maximize their support of their local or international communities in need.

Your continued generosity and support to the Annual Fund-Share ensures our district can carry on projects that improve the lives of people in our local community and around the world. Thank you for Doing Good in the World!

Your District Foundation Grants Committee has, and will continue, to have a "let's find a way to get to YES" attitude. This positive attitude supports clubs in taking advantage of District and Global Grants.

The \$400,156 donated in 2016-17 came back to us last year, 2019-20, with \$200,078 in District Designated Funds (DDF) that we split 50/50 to support District and Global Grants. The remaining \$200,078 stays with the World Fund and is SHARED by all Rotary Clubs and Foundation programs.

Last Rotary year we were able support club funded projects with 20 District Grants awarding \$104,292 of DDF. Plus, we supported 13 Global Grants with \$235,134 of DDF. The 13 Global grants also received \$448,090 from the WORLD FUND. DDF that is not used in the year it is received is rolled into the next year. The result was last year we were able to use DDF and the World Fund to support our club projects with \$787,516. Several clubs were able to get a total \$123,352 of matching funds from the Canadian Government. Once you add in the Club funds, DDF, World Fund and the Canadian Government matches you get \$1,295,087 of Doing Good in the World.

Spearheaded by Paul P. Harris, a Chicago lawyer, the club's membership expanded rapidly, as did its focus; Rotarians were soon using their newfound comradeship to reach out to less fortunate members of their community. The movement came to Canada in 1910, when the first Canadian club, the Winnipeg Rotary Club, was founded by P.A.C. McIntyre.

### Rotary International in Canada, 2010 - 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary



"It is a man's job to be a good Rotarian, and he who lives up to the precepts will be a good neighbour, a kind friend, a loving husband, a companionable father, and an asset to the community in which he lives."

Oh, the simple pleasures of small-town life: the sense of fellowship and community; the warm, friendly neighbourhood ties. If only these rural values could be brought to life in the city.

And so began a movement—one that was born in a backroom in Chicago and would soon send ripples of goodwill across the border and around the world.



**Rotary District 5050** extends from Everett, Washington, USA to Hope, British Columbia, Canada.

An easy way to remember the geographical location is that we are between Seattle, WA and Vancouver, BC but without either city.

Our District follows the I5 from Everett, across the border to the Lower Mainland, then up Highway 1 through the Fraser Valley.

Rotary first came to the Pacific Northwest, with the founding of the Seattle Rotary Club as "Club Number Four" (following Chicago, San Francisco and Oakland).

With the creation of new Rotary clubs, there have been many changes in the geographical areas and District numbering of the clubs that now comprise District 5050.

Everett, the oldest club in District 5050, was chartered March 1st, 1917 as Club Number 242.

Until 1945, Washington, Oregon, British Columbia, Alaska and parts of Idaho formed one district (under various numbers including District 15, 22, 1 and 102).

In 1945, major subdivisions were made on both a North-South and East-West basis. District 101 (later renumbered as 151) emerged and for a time we were the largest geographical district in the world of Rotary.

New subdivisions in 1956 removed Vancouver Island and Washington State, south of the King Country line from what now constitutes our District. In 1957, District 151 was redesignated as District 504 with no change

in boundaries.

In 1973, further changes removed Alaska and the Yukon to separate districts and moved the southern boundary to South West 152nd Street in Snohomish County, Washington.

In the succeeding decade, with a dramatic increase in the number of clubs and the extensive distance between the southern and northern clubs, the need for further redistricting became evident. A committee was formed in 1984 to study the problem. After considering several alternatives, a recommendation was submitted to Rotary International to split District 504 into two districts of about 30 clubs each.

The redistricting request was approved in February 1986. On July 1st, 1987, District 505 was established with 16 clubs in the State of Washington and 15 clubs in British Columbia.

The east, west and southern boundaries were not changed and the northern boundary was established as being approximately the Fraser River. Despite the separation, Districts 504 and 505 continued to enjoy a special relationship with one another, and have held joint District Conferences on three occasions (1992, 1994 and 2006).

On July 1st, 1991, District 505 became District 5050 as a part of the worldwide process of renumbering to accommodate overall growth in the world of Rotary.

Currently, there are fifty-eight clubs in District 5050 with a total membership of just over 2,700 Rotarians.

Throughout all of the changes, we have always been an international District. Our motto is: "50% American, 50% Canadian, 100% Rotarian".

We are also known as the "Peace Arch District". The Peace Arch stands on the longest undefended national border, with one foot anchored in American soil and one in Canadian soil, approximately in the middle of Rotary District 5050.
