In a special function attended by Chief Guest Mr. NARESH CHANDRA, Minister of State for Information, Urban Development and Parliamentary Affairs and Guest of honour Mr. GARY SMITH,

Deputy High Commissioner of Canada (in New Delhi, India), the then President-Elect of Rotary Club of Burnaby-Hastings **AL MCLEAN** presented the cheque for a quarter of million Rupees to the then President of **ROTARY CLUB OF LUCKNOW KHAS** Dr. **SUDERSHAN YAJNIK** for **PROJECT EYESIGHT-INDIA.**

This was the start of the journey for **CANADIAN EYESIGHT GLOBAL** with commitment to serve the rural population of India for decades to come.

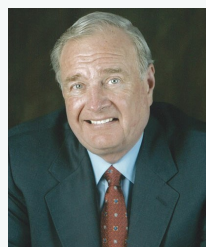

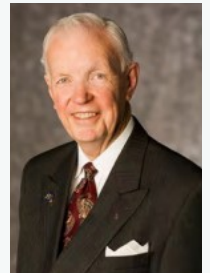

A grief-stricken Rotarian couple gives Jeevandaan to four people

An inspiring article by Rasheeda Bhagat published in January 2021 issue of Rotary News India

When the strapping young Srikanth, an engineering undergraduate just beginning his career in Hyderabad, was on his way to his grandmother's house on his 26th birthday on Sep 24 to seek her blessings, fate had other plans for him.

He was riding a motorbike and a dog suddenly ran across his path, right in front of his two-wheeler. In an effort to try and save it, he swerved wildly and crashed on the road, sustaining grievous head injuries.

Srikanth, the son of Bikina Chakravarthi, a past president of RC Mandapeta, who has also been an assistant governor of RID 3020, was hospitalised for 25 days, and even though he valiantly fought his injuries after undergoing surgery at the Global Hospital, Hyderabad, several post-operative complications left him brain-dead, leaving his

father, mother Bhanu and sister Srilekha in a whirlpool of sorrow and pain.

But even though engulfed in the deep pain of having lost her young son, his mother Bhanu plucked up the courage to discuss with Chakravarthi the possibility of donating their son's organs under the Telangana government's Jeevandan (cadaver transplant scheme) so that even in his death the youngster could help others.

The father readily agreed, and in the third week of October, Srikanth's heart, two kidneys and liver were donated, giving a new lease of life to four people. The recipients included another 26-year-old youth, suffering from a weak heart, who has now got a healthy, strong heart ticking in his chest cavity, thanks to the generosity and timely intervention of Srikanth's parents.

Speaking to Rotary News Chakravarthi said his son was not only absolutely healthy but also full of life and joy and had a huge circle of friends. "My wife and I decided that even though we were grieving and mourning his loss, and our suffering would be lifelong, we had it in our power to make four other families happy. That gave us some happiness." They would have loved to know who were the recipients of their son's heart and other organs, "but privacy laws of the government do not allow the hospital to reveal that information."

Srikanth's parents are still learning about the special qualities of his son, a Paul Harris

Fellow. "His friends are now telling us that he was extremely generous and kind-hearted, and if anybody needed any help, he would not hesitate to do his best to help them."

Srilekha, his sister, says she misses her brother terribly, and can never forget his love for food and passion for music. "He would eat all kinds of food, including junk food and was very fond of different kinds of music, particularly film songs and classical music."

But along with her parents, she too is happy that her brother lives on in four others and this gesture of her parents will bring them and her a sense of peace.

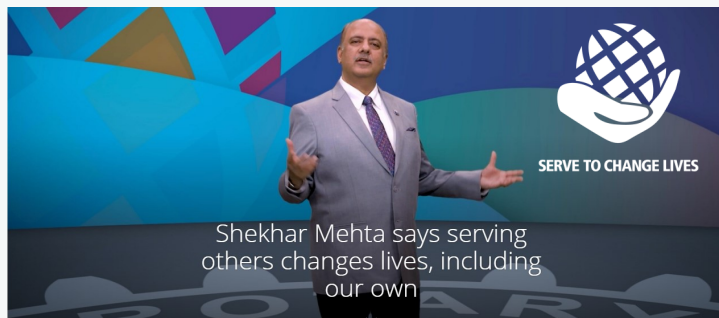


Rotary Presidential Theme 2021-22 announced

He cited moving stories of how people's lives have been changed by Rotary.

Rotary International President's Message

FEBRUARY 2021

In Rotary, 23 February is our anniversary, and February is also the month when we focus on promoting peace. There is a reason for this: Contributing to peace and international understanding has been a high priority for us since our earliest days.

We are often asked: "How can we get involved in peace now?" There are many paths to peace in Rotary. Our youth programs point us in the direction of Positive Peace, as does the work of intercountry committees and the Rotary Action Group for Peace.

Another path is the Rotarian Peace Projects Incubator (RPPI), an inspirational collaboration among Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary Peace Fellows and alumni. Led by Rotarians in Switzerland and Liechtenstein, RPPI has designed 48 global projects that any club can support, either directly or through Rotary Foundation global grants. Nino Lotishvili and Matthew Johnsen, alumni of the Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, are two of

the many volunteers.

During my Rotary peace journey, I have learned how personal resilience helps build inner peace and create sustainable outer peace. This was the inspiration behind the Women Peace Ambassadors for the South Caucasus project, which is based on my field research in Georgia. The RPPI team of Rotarians and peace fellows recognized the incredible potential of women from mixed-ethnicity families who live on borderlands to be role models for peace within and beyond their communities. Through workshops on building inner and outer peace that draw on the power of storytelling, 40 participants will be sharing their stories and reaching around 400 extended family and community members. These inspiring but marginalized women will reclaim their inner strength as peacebuilders at the grassroots level. In this way, we will take steps toward the sustainable, peaceful society we need so much, not only in our region, but throughout the world. — Nino Lotishvili

I was excited to join the peace incubator project and to further strengthen my ties with Rotary's peace community by working with past and current peace fellows to develop these proposals. My team wrote five

proposals — three in Bangladesh, one in Iraq, and one in Poland — that focus on the arts and on education to generate dialogue across religious divisions and avert the radicalization of young people. I was inspired by how, despite the pandemic, we came together via technology with a vision to develop, test, and strengthen ideas and to produce workable solutions that clubs across the world can support to advance peace. I am excited to work with Rotary's peace community to transform these visions into reality. — Matthew Johnsen
